

Take for example snowflakes with their unique designs & shapes - amazing!




I have always been fascinated by these little detailed works of art falling from the winter sky. Snowflakes are fantastic examples of symmetry and balance.

Water: Logic of the Logos

When we read the creation account of Genesis, we see that God creates an order, a structure to His creation. This order is depicted as we see Him separate light from darkness (vss. 3, 4), then we see increasing separations and diversity of elements such as water separating from water, with the sky (heavens) appearing (vss. 6-8), followed by the seas and the earth (vss. 9, 10). Throughout this account is a beautiful, increasingly-complex progression of creative activity. Following the foundational creation of the structure of the universe, the stage was now set for the subsequent creation of all forms of life - plants, animals of all kinds, an ultimately humans. According to the account, this was done by God by the power of his word. God literally "spoke" the all of creation into existence. Each stage of creation is prefaced with the phrase "And God said..."

When the Apostle John wrote his account of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, he chose to open his account with terminology which would have been familiar to his Jewish audience, but also to the Greek cultural and philosophical background of his Gentile audience. John writes, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through him, and without him was not any thing made that was made." (Joh 1:1-3 ESV) John wrote this in the Greek language, and where he uses the English word "Word," it is translated from the Greek word "logos." This is understandable to the Jewish readers because of the obvious power of God's word as He spoke all of creation into existence in perfect order. For the Gentile audience, familiar with the philosophers, this word "logos" carried the meaning of not only "word" as we would think of it, but also meaning "reason" or "plan." This is why we use the word "logic" in English to describe a reasoned, organized collection or sequence of ideas. The creation account in Genesis is the epitome of logic. As God organizes creation, it is a perfect progression of logical steps to produce the perfect result, as God repeatedly says, "...it was good." If something is accounted as "good" by God, it must be perfect because perfection is His standard of "good."

Even though corruption entered the creation because of sin, not all of the beauty of God's creation was destroyed, and we can see this beauty all around us if we will take the time to appreciate it.

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
Water...

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As the apostle Paul writes in Romans 1:20, "For his invisible attributes, namely, his eternal power and divine nature, have been clearly perceived, ever since the creation of the world, in the things that have been made." This divine beauty is visible, certainly in the large things around us (nature, mountains, seas, sun, moon, planets and stars, etc.), and also in the things that are too small for us to see with our eyes.

There is a beautiful, perfect logic to the structure of matter, too small to see, but detectable by our senses and modern scientific methods. How is it that two simple elements such as hydrogen and oxygen (both gasses in their separate natural states) can come together to form a liquid called "water" with wonderful, complex, and unique properties? God ordered it that way by His "word," his logic from the beginning! If we could see one molecule of water, what would it look like? We don't know for certain, but we can make a good guess... it would look something like this:

If we then take liquid water and make it cold, it can form something beautiful, ice crystals. Snow is an



example of ice crystals, and it is thought that no two snowflakes are alike, because the unique properties of water mean that it can form an almost infinite number of shapes, but always ordered in some familiar patterns. What does the water molecule look like when it is frozen into ice? Again, the best guess of science is that it would look something like this example showing three water molecules frozen together:

What we see is that when water is frozen, the water molecules begin to "stick"



or bind to one another in orderly patterns, but can do so in several different ways so that they can form the wonderful variety of snowflakes we see (see Trish's article on the previous page!). Some scientists say that water's unique properties are responsible for life itself. Of course, we know that God is the source of life, but it is clear when we study nature and chemistry that He has used water as part of the created order to support life in a beautiful way. Praise God, the Logos, who is also our Creator and Savior Jesus, for the beauty and life-giving power of His logic!

The Evangelism of Beauty

All around us are signposts pointing us to the Lord. Beauty is one of these. Just as all truth points us to the One who is truth, and just as everything good points us to the One who is perfectly good, so too beauty points us to the One who is purely and wholly beautiful. This is God's purpose for beauty. A beautiful sunset is not merely to be marveled at, it is also meant to captivate our minds and hearts in wonder at the artist who orchestrates such a sight. Psalm 19:1 says, "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the sky above proclaims his handiwork." The beauty of creation is God's way of saying to us, "Look, do you see how magnificent my handiwork is? Now imagine how magnificent I am." God has meant for beauty to lead us to Him. We are made for beauty because we are made for God.

This evangelistic aspect of beauty is not only true of God's creative works in creation, it is also true of the creative works we produce. The beauty of a decorated home points the family who resides there to their eternal homeland. Jesus said He has gone to prepare a place for us, and that in His Father's house there are many rooms. And we know the place Jesus is preparing for us in the Father's house is not ugly, but beautiful. The beauty of our current homes, yards and gardens, however modest and simple, entice our hearts and minds for our true and everlasting home. Think of the Tabernacle and Temple in ancient Israel. In Exodus 31 we read of God setting apart Bezalel and Oholiab to decorate and furnish the Tabernacle. Gold, silver, bronze, jewels, stone, and wood were all to be artistically crafted with designs. There was also to be incense and finely worked garments for Aaron and his sons. Why? Why all of this art? Why all this fashion, this decor, this atmosphere? It was to point the Israelites to God. As the Israelites experienced the beauty of God's house their minds and hearts were lifted to the beautiful majesty of God Himself.

We have all experienced the enticing and luring affect of beauty. This may most commonly be experienced through music. Music has a profound propensity to pull on our heart-strings. Music can transport us beyond the here and now, lifting us to the transcendent.

Music, and beauty in general, make us aware that we were made for more than anything this world has to offer. As C. S. Lewis famously said, "If I find in myself a desire which no experience in this world can satisfy, the most probable explanation is that I was made for another world."

The younger generation today, those in their teens and twenties, hold beauty in high regard. There is a fascination among young people today with beauty and the experience of beauty. This gives all of us the opportunity to share with them the One who is Beauty. To share with them that the longing they experience listening to certain music, or watching a certain movie, is actually longing of their souls for the Great Creator, the One who made them, and is behind all beauty. Brothers and sisters, may we not squander this opportunity. May we not allow "The Arts" to be monopolized by non-believers. May we fill our own lives with beauty, anticipating the day when we shall "behold the beauty of the LORD." (Psalm 27:4)

A phone call out of the blue with a voice on the other end that says, "You were on my mind. How is God working

in your life right now?" The smell of dinner cooking and the sight of a place set at the table for eternal souls to feed physically on food and spiritually on fellowship. The smell of a clean shirt as it slips over your head. The sound of beautiful music quietly playing. The paycheck in the bank earned by hard work from someone willing to get up and do it all again, that will provide food on the table, clothes on the back, and a roof over the head of other souls. The sound of a child taking a turn to pray and listening to that little voice give thanks to our Lord. The sound of an adult's voice praying and giving thanks that sets the example for others. The notes of hymns being sung by a group who WANT to lift their voices together in worship. A Christian friendship that has lasted for years and where each can trust the other to always point them back to Christ. The child sitting in time-out because the parents love them so much they will repeatedly correct them and teach them the ways of God. Watching a child choose to be polite and kind after the 999,999th time of being corrected. A home filled with peace because during hard times God's ways are pursued. Truth being repeatedly spoken to another soul until that soul finally hears it. Knees bent and head bowed in prayer as a troubled soul trusts God with the trial that is out of their control. The sight of a family member with Bible opened and truth being read. The the deep sound of a man's voice reading scripture aloud and encouraging those listening to trust in God's ways. All of these things are simple but time consuming. All these things can be done but take effort by

someone to get them done. All of these things are beautiful when done in the name of Christ. All these things and many more are tiny pieces of beauty in life that can quietly point other eternal souls to Christ. Now go back through this list and come up with the opposite of these beautiful things and you will see ways to make life ugly.

During this time of Covid we have two ways to view the days in front of us. Either God has limited our ability to use the tool of beauty to glorify Him to others, or He has made it perfectly clear which eternal souls He wants each of us to focus on. We each have different circumstances, gifts, and people in our lives. We each have different ways to use this tool of beauty. Pray and ask God for wisdom about how He wants you to use this tool. Again I say, **beauty is a powerful and compelling force that draws people**. Creativity, the Arts, and the Church

An Interview with Bruce Wade

As the Campus Missionary and Director of the Baptist Student Union at the Missouri S&T campus, Bruce Wade is on the front lines of reaching out and ministering to young adults in higher education. The Rolla campus is not known for its arts but for science and engineering. However, a university education requires an arts component so the students will be well-rounded in their outlook. Therefore, the arts are an important part of the campus experience. Here is an interview which Pastor Matt conducted with Bruce to get his perspective on the importance of creativity and the arts in our Christian faith.

Matt: Much of the Church seems to be disengaged from the arts. Do you believe this is the case? Why or why not?

Bruce: *First: We're probably talking about Evangelical churches (specifically SBC churches) in America. That being the case, I think the point is largely correct (certainly in the case of fine arts). I would distinguish between popular music (even worship music) and graphic illustrations versus finer expressions in the arts (musical compositions for instruments and choirs, paintings, theater, and architecture).*

I would suppose (without scientific data) that this may be due, in part, to our tendency toward the pragmatic borne from our frontier or mostly rural heritage. Most of our churches are smaller and don't have the resources to finance works of art. Some may see spending on fine arts as frivolous (while enjoying art that others have produced).

Second: On the other hand, some of what is called "fine art" today is anything but fine and few have the temerity to inform the emperor that his clothing is a lie. This has left a bad impression for the arts on some.

Matt: What do you believe are the ramifications of Christians disengaging from the arts?

Bruce: *God is our Creator. He has implanted His Creative nature—with a capital "C"—in humanity with a lower case "c". By this, I mean that we cannot actually create (ex nihilo), but we can reflect the Creator and teach about Him through the arts. Also, He created us to perceive His Greatness with all of our senses. This being the case, we need to communicate His Truth through all the senses. If we don't, we miss opportunities to fulfill the Great Commission. Is it just possible that beauty is not merely in the eye of the beholder, but something that reflects the Creator?*

Matt: Historically Christians took the artistic expression of their faith very seriously. I'm thinking of the paintings and sculptures of the Italian Renaissance, the work of Rembrandt, and music such as Handel's Messiah. What lessons do we learn from this history?

Bruce: *If you would indulge some sarcasm: it might point to the benefit of a powerful church benefactor who sells indulgences in order (in part) to finance the arts. But, to be serious, the population was largely illiterate in the dark ages and the arts pointed to God—making the renaissance even more important. Modern historians have tended to focus on the failing of some of these artists, but many were very devoted to Christ and were serving Him by creating works of various artistic expressions.*

These works of art and architecture pointed the worshiper to God—lifting the spirits, and the viewers' heads, as they took in the murals. The music could soothe and terrify in the different movements, taking the listener on an emotional journey as it became what we would call a sound track for the biblical stories they were telling. We would do well to encourage

committed artists to teach us of God's wonder through the arts today.

Matt: Many Christians do not believe themselves to be artistic. How can the faith of these brothers and sisters be enriched through their own creativity and that of others?

Bruce: *Honestly, not many will be professional artists in any medium. They're called "starving artists" for a reason. I believe, however, that many of our folks have within them the spark of the Creator. It may have been criticized at a young age, but it might revive if we give it a chance.*

At its best, creating artistic expression as a Christian is an individual act of worship that facilitates others' worship experiences. It is connecting with the Creator. It must not, however, be an end in itself. It must not be just another idol. Like so many professions, it is a tool to serve and worship God.

Matt: Lastly, what role can our creativity play in our worship of God?

Bruce: *I touched on that just a bit above. Drama, architecture, music, and paintings can all be employed to aid in our worship experiences. Drama and music illustrate the message a pastor is communicating. Paintings and a building's architecture help us to focus on why we've gathered.*

I saw little or no value in what I thought was needless primping when I was just going to get dirty anyways. Many times, I felt like a duck out of water when I was with other girls my age.

Things didn't improve much as I grew up. There was a longing in me to be feminine, to strive for beauty, but I didn't understand all the confusing emotions that came with the longing. My perception of femininity and beauty was someone who was fragile, helpless and consumed with looks. However, I had always been physically strong and capable of doing just about anything that needed done. I had trouble blending my perception of feminine with the person I already knew I was. As a young girl I rejected the thought of me being beautiful so intensely that it caused me to question God's wisdom in making me a girl. Many times I would cry hot tears of frustration because He didn't make me a boy. I just couldn't understand why I had been made a girl when I enjoyed doing anything but what girls enjoyed! When I started seeing my husband in high school, he was very happy that I liked all the "manly pursuits" as much as he did. We spent most of our dating years hunting, fishing, playing ball, and being outdoors as much as possible. His appreciation of me loving these activities seemed to be a confirmation that I was just a 'weird' woman and I wrongly resigned myself to the thought that I would never be like other women.

Thank God He doesn't leave us to our wrong thinking!

We got married after dating for five years and very quickly started having children. The first baby was a darling little girl. She was beautiful! Then quickly after, two more beautiful little ladies joined our family. Oh my, did they love princesses, pink dresses, dolls and dress up clothes! High heel shoes and sparkly accessories were adored and eagerly talked about at long lengths by my little girly girls. What I discovered in those moments of delighting in my daughter's enjoyment of beautiful things is the reason little girls so thoroughly enjoy all these things: God put it in them because it is in Him. Though it wasn't obvious to me outwardly, beauty was in me because of His presence living there.

When little girls grow up, they become women who are made in the image of a beautiful God and Savior. Every single one. God made men to be examples of His strength and power, leadership and courage. Women with their beauty and femininity, grace and resilience are examples of God and carry His attributes the same as their male counterparts. Each of those characteristics are unique and beautiful in their own way and are a necessity to carry out God's plan on the earth. The beauty of the Lord is displayed for all to see, especially in His chief creation, mankind. We can be very quick to give up on seeing the beauty because of the fallen world we live in right now. But God doesn't let us have an excuse. He has told us in His Word to focus on Him and we will see True Beauty. When we focus on the difficulties in life, on the sin that is all around, on our own shortcomings, we become bogged down and easy prey for Satan. Jesus has shown us a better way; look to the face of the Anointed One. He is the epitome of all that's admired and wanted, pure and graceful, majestic and strong, a shining diadem of God's Glory. They don't need to be perfect for me to love them and appreciate their uniqueness. Through this thought, God has shown me that this is the way He thinks of me. Whether digging in the garden with dirty hands or going shopping for shoes it makes no difference. He knows what's on the inside and to Him it's beautiful.
